



Note from Editor: Due to an ongoing health issue, Tom will not be contributing new articles for awhile. For now, we will dip into his vast archives while he's on the mend. Please keep Tom in your thoughts and prayers.

January 2002

Last week I received an e-mail from a reader asking for help with speed control. It came at the perfect time as I had begun searching for the topic that I would address in this month's installment; after nearly fifty columns ideas for new material do not always spring forth. So, as a way of keeping the information flowing, please feel free to send an e-mail, make a phone call or dispatch a carrier pigeon with any questions. Chances are good that I can address your concerns in detail right here.

Speed control can be very difficult to discuss in specific terms. For example, if you are coaching someone on a shot, how do you tell that person exactly how hard to hit it? Words like "soft," "medium" and "hard" fail to cover the range of possibility. And we know that very slight variations in the power applied to a shot can cause great differences in result. So we need ways to learn and practice what we call touch.


To begin we must understand where that touch originates. Although pool requires constant thought and complex decision making, we play the game with our hands, one hand really, the shooting hand. Just as it is with most endeav-

ors, particularly artistic ones, the feel required to make fine adjustments lives in the fingers. Our best pool game always emerges during those times when we move the game out of our heads and into our hands.

The primary cause for position errors is not lack of skill but the absence of complete thinking. As I've written in the past, precise position play results from two critical steps during the preparation for a shot. First, while standing and studying the shot, the player must identify precisely where he wants to leave the cue ball by choosing a pinpoint rather than an area on the table. The second step after choosing that pinpoint is to forget about it, simply let go of it to focus on pocketing the ball. In that moment where you allow yourself to forget about the spot you chose your hand is liberated to perform. Clinging to thoughts about position during the shot will cause internal nagging and physical tension as in any experience with incomplete or unresolved matters.

> Another cause speed errors is opting for cue-ball tracks that invite them. After choosing the spot discussed above examine the line from that spot to the next object ball. Now compare the cueball path you are considering to that line to determine if the cue ball will be moving on that line or across it. A shot with the cue ball moving across the line requires perfect speed while a path along the line allows for error. Shot A in the diagram is a very simple example of that principle. Once you have determined that you want to leave the cue ball on the X for a straight-shot on the eight to hit a stop shot for the nine, how do you get there? inexperienced player chooses the one-rail, solid-line path, which intersects the desired position line almost

for



perpendicularly thus requiring perfect speed to stop the cue ball on it. The seasoned player hits this shot with draw and left english to move onto the line off the second rail, a path that yields the desired angle on the eight ball with a considerable margin for speed error. Many if not most shots offer options for the cue ball and better players identify and choose the paths that widen the margin for error regarding speed.

Now we need a method for adjusting easily to the speed of a strange table. Great players can do so with most tables after just a few shots. A useful tool is a reference speed for all tables, one that will help your hand make the proper adjustments for all of the shots that you will encounter. I use one called lag speed and I like to tune it in before I play on a strange table. Place the cue ball as it is in shot B and shoot it straight through the center of the table to hit the foot rail, come back and hit the head rail with enough speed to rebound and stop within a half diamond of where it originated. Three or four consecutive, successful trials will work to begin tuning your hand to the table's speed.

The ability to play with precise speed control and adjust one's touch to different tables comes mainly from experience. Experience also teaches us to make definite and smart choices. Always look closely at your next shot to avoid leaving yourself too straight when you need to move the cue ball or too thin when you need keep the cue ball close. Choosing the correct angles will allow you to play more shots with comfortable speeds that are easier to control, which beats finding yourself trying to power one shot and bunt the next to stay in position. That is how great players can go through racks seemingly hitting every shot with the same speed.

Not So Fast on Carrying on Your Pool Cue...Just Yet

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Transportation Security Administration's (TSA) policy changes to remove certain small knives and sporting equipment from the prohibited items list were originally scheduled to go into effect April 25, 2013. However, in order to accommodate further input from the Aviation Security Advisory Committee (ASAC), which includes representatives from the aviation community, passenger advocates, law enforcement experts, and other stakeholders, TSA will temporarily delay implementation of these changes. This timing will enable TSA to incorporate the ASAC's feedback about the changes to the prohibited items list and continue workforce training.

When implemented, the following sporting equipment will be permitted through TSA security checkpoints: billiard cues, ski poles, hockey sticks, lacrosse sticks, and

golf clubs (limited to two). This change includes the allowance of small novelty and toy bats through checkpoints. These bats must be 24 inches or shorter in length or weigh less than 24 ounces if they are longer than 24 inches. Full-size baseball, softball, and cricket bats (longer than 24 inches and heavier than 24 ounces) continue to be prohibited from carry-on luggage and must be placed in checked baggage.

It is important to note that TSOs have the discretion to prohibit an individual from carrying an item through the screening checkpoint or onboard an aircraft if they believe the item poses a security threat. Therefore, TSA security screening personnel make the final decision on whether to permit items into the sterile area of the airport. If a passenger is unsure if an item meets the requirements described above, TSA recommends that the item be placed in checked baggage. Travelers should also check with their airline or travel agent for policies, as individual airlines may place additional restrictions on any item.



The Interview:

Viper: Where were you born?

Lu: Hsinchu, Tawain

Lu: I am the oldest of five children and none of them play pool

Viper: Who's your favorite female pool player?

Lu: Alison Fisher because she is so consistent and a very nice person

Viper: Where and when did you first start playing pool?

Stevie: I was 13 years old, and visited a bookshop that housed a pool table and I was intrigued by the game so I started playing.

Viper: What are your biggest accomplishments in the sport of billiards so far in your young career?

Lu: In 1998 I won my first WPA world junior 9-ball championships

Viper: Do you currently have any sponsors?

Lu: No and I am looking for sponsorships for here in the USA. Later in the spring I plan on coming back and playing in more US events including the US Open.

Viper: Did you ever play in a pool league?

Lu: NO, they do not exist in Taiwan

Viper: Are you good at any other sports?

Lu: I started playing baseball in elementary school and got really good

Viper: Describe yourself in three words? Lu: Quiet, dedicated and determined

Viper: If you had to live your life over again, what would one thing you change about yourself and/or your pool career?

Lu: I have had the opportunity to travel the world and I wouldn't change a thing. \odot

Viper: Who were/are your favorite professionals?

Lu: I really liked Rodney Morris, when I was a kid I got to watch him in action and he was unbeatable in Taiwan.

Viper: How do you prepare for events?

Lu: I listen to my music on my iPod and practice for a few hours per day. I work on my break and play the ghost. I like to listen to American hip-hop music – Lady Ga Ga

Viper: What was the best advice you were ever given?

Lu: The National Coach for the Taiwanese team told me once growing up to not ever worry about the score and try to stay relaxed as much as possible.

Lu: I love everything about competing especially when I am winning.

The 6th Annual Wyoming Open Was a Great Success For Many

Saratoga, Wyoming - USA's #1 ranked Shane Van Boening went undefeated to win the 6th Annual Wyoming Open. The South Dakota native defeated Hawaii's Rocket Rodney Morris in the 8-Ball bar table event that boasted a full field of 48 in the Masters Division. The event was produced by E.J. Glode and co-promoted by Dragon Promotions. Drawing over 150 players in 3 divisions, the Wyoming Open is widely regarded as the biggest and best pool event in 6 states. The event was sponsored by Asia's #1 pro cloth Andy Cloth and Master Chalk. Local partners are Duke's Bar & Grill and Riviera Lodge and all events coordinated by Shively Hardware.

In the Sportsman Division featuring novice players, Mike Kozeniewski of Wyoming won the 50 player division. He defeated Dwain Twiford twice in the finals. The Classic Division featured a full 64 player field of advanced players and \$1600 for 1st place. Colorado's Don Clements went undefeated including wins over runner-up Kevin Wall twice.

The main event open to masters level as well as professionals featured \$5000 added to the purse, not including a calcutta which featured another \$6000 in prizes. Early favorites included Rodney Morris, Stevie Moore, Charlie Williams, Raj Hundal, Rafael Martinez, and Shane Van Boening. Other notable names were Marc Vidal of Spain (and Colorado!) and Mark Tadd of Utah.

All the favorites made it to the final 16 bracket. In the re-draw, Martinez defeated Hundal while Vidal made an upset over Charlie Williams 7-5. Van Boening defeated Moore, Martinez 6-5, and another hill-hill thriller over Rodney Morris 6-5. Hundal then shutout Stevie Moore 7-0 while Williams bounced back with 2 more wins to make the final 8.

Martinez, Hundal, Williams, Vidal

rounded out the final 8

The final day saw Rafael Martinez defeat Williams 7-4 while Morris won over Hundal. Morris then went on to win a tough 7-5 match over Martinez after being down 4-0. He then went on to eliminate Vidal 7-5 who finished 3rd. Notable finishes by non-pro players included 5th place by Ricardo Martinez (unrelated to Rafael) and Bruce Wilson who got 7th.

The finals pitted two red hot players in Morris vs Van Boening. Both players went #2 and #1 respectively in the player auction. The match went extremely fast. Morris had beaten Van Boening in the past 5 other tournaments. But Van Boening's break seemed unstoppable, and Morris scratched the final break giving the match to Shane 7-5.

"The way I've been playing, I knew Shane would have to play absolutely perfect to beat me. And sure enough, he played a flawless two matches against me this tournament. My hat's off to him", said Morris.

"Bar Box 8-Ball is my all time favorite game", said Shane.

The Wyoming Open also had a second chance Hard Luck 9-Ball event for the players knocked out early. This was won by Ace Brown of Utah who was thrilled to finally win his first trophy at the Wyoming Open in 6 tries. Several minitournaments were held at Duke's Bar that went on to 3am.

"I'm finally starting to shoot loose! It's so much fun! I won't ever miss this tournament!", said Brad Kallevig.

26 kids also showed up to play in the Wyoming Open Qualifier for the USA Junior Nationals hosted by the BEF (Billiard Education Foundation). Kids 17 and under came from Nebraska, Colorado, and all over Wyoming. The tournament was a bright gem that brightened further the atmosphere of the Wyoming Open, and the success was due to Mrs. Samm Vidal, new director of the BEF.

"The Wyoming Open is the biggest week for my business and for many others in our town. E.J. is always trying to improve the event, and this year is by far the best Wyoming Open ever!", said Chris Duke, owner of Duke's Bar & Grill. Duke is one of the event's primary sponsors and partner.

sion, 18-year-old Geoffrey Quezada of Arvada went undefeated to claim the likes of a \$300 academic scholarship made possible by Str8 Shots. 15-year-old Josh Bustos, who was already qualified for Junior Nationals,

exchanged run outs with Quezada in the finals before settling for second and \$200 in scholarship bucks. Kristiana Lievanos, the only girl in the division made her way to the semi-finals to take third and a paid entry into Nationals.

In the 14 & Under division, 14-year-old Tyler Casey came back through the b-side after losing his first match to 10-year-old Baron Mauro. 

Adventure Time in Saratoga, WY

(A little about Krystle in her own words: "Well, I'm a flute player pursuing a Masters degree in Flute Performance. My life is pretty open ended right now and I'm coming to terms with that one day at a time.")

Pool has always been a pretty large part of my life: I grew up playing in bars while mom worked and while my family hung just downtown (small towns allow small



children into their small bars). I distinctly remember playing pool with my first crush, barely able to see over the table, and the joy I had in winning the "game," (Although let's be honest, it was not a legitimate game of pool, throwing the balls around and hitting at them with bar sticks). In high school I participated in leagues, we lied about my age so that I could play in different bars around town on Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday nights (15 to 18 isn't that big of a difference, right?) and I played in countless different bar tournaments. I bought my first intermediate flute with money from pool tournaments and I played pool every night from as soon as the bus dropped me off at the bar until I went to bed. Pool permeated my life in a way that didn't negatively affect my school, music, or sports. I somehow managed to do it all ridiculous amounts of pool while playing around town.

Unfortunately my undergraduate degree brought on insane amounts of practice with the flute: rehearsals, concerts, and classes. Studying both music and philosophy I rarely had the time to go to the gym and eat food, much less go to a bar to throw down some money and play some pool. So for years I took a pool hiatus 9 months out of the year.

It was awful.

But then I moved to Laramie to pursue a graduate degree in flute performance. It was here that I saw a sign for a pool tournament on campus, a tournament I enthusiastically signed up. Things weren't going well between my then-boyfriend and me and I needed to do something that reminded me of who I was. This tournament was it. I later learned that it was a regional qualifier, the very same tournament that brought me to the ACUI regionals in Salt Lake City where I finished undefeated as the number one seed for nationals. Pool made a sudden, unexpected comeback into my life and I have shamelessly embraced it. Now I play in weekly tournaments

here in Laramie, sometimes traveling down to Fort Collins for the tougher competition and the better tables. I have been watching professional matches on YouTube in between practicing the flute at school and at night while I wind down from the day with a glass of wine. So it's not surprising that I have been jumping at the opportunity to travel to see the pro's play and to test myself against better competition.

My first trip of this sort happened on March 23rd when I drove down to the Englewood pool hall Felt to see Nick Varner and Thorsten Hohmann play, with the intentions of playing in the 8-ball barbox tournament. Unfortunately due to the weather I showed up too late for the tournament to work out, but watching Nick and Thorsten play and hearing what they had to say about pool got me even more excited about the sport. There's just something about watching a live match over a YouTube match that is just super exciting.

Which brings us to this last weekend. Oddly enough the University of Wyoming had Good Friday off for an Easter break, which turned out to be a convenient day off for me as a pool fan! I had known about the sixth annual Platte Valley Open pool tournament in Saratoga for a while,

but I decided at the last minute that I wanted to shoot in the tournament. The final draw was hearing that Shane Van Boening was going to be there, because Shane is the pool player of my dreams right now. I have watched almost every one of his matches on YouTube and am always on the lookout for new matches of his online whether nine ball, ten ball, barbox or large table, straight pool, anything. So hearing that he was going to be shooting pool at a place that was mere hours from my apartment was enough to get me to hop in my car and drive. I decided to try my hand at the Classic division and somehow managed to get in. With a \$100 entrance fee, a \$120 motel room fee, \$30 for gas, and money for food and drinks, I was definitely

stretching my financial situation for this tournament. And it was so worth it.

Although I lost my first match to Richard Case, a man that I would later become friends with, my first day in Saratoga was amazing. I was there with my buddies Scott Maloney and Delilah Ye Feng, and was in the midst of cheering on Scott when I heard that Shane Van Boening and Rodney Morris were in the finals of a mini-day tournament at the local bar, Duke's. I shamelessly bailed on Scott to go watch the match. Shane and Rodney were playing a strange hybrid of 8-ball and 9-ball that EJ had devised solely for this tournament and that I had never seen before. So, unsurprisingly, I stood by a fellow pool player and struck about a conversation about the ball colors and the numbers. You see, for this Saratoga game (that's what they dubbed this unique hybrid) the numbers 1-6, 7-12, and 13 were used, omitting the 14 and 15 balls—and the numbers did not match up to the typical ball numbers. 1 in normal pool is yellow, 1 in this game was green, and etc. So I asked the fellow next to me which was which and we started chatting (I think the ball colors matched up with snooker ball colors, but I'm still not sure).

For a long time, both my "in-tournament" and "out-tournament" personalities were one and the same. Ah, those were the days. (If you think I'm a bitch now, you should have known me back then.) Time, and society, have managed to wear off some of my angles and I'm no longer a curmudgeonly stegosaurus all the time. One of my greatest challenges, if not THE greatest challenge, has been the separation of my in-tournament and out-tournament self.

"Out-tournament" is exactly what it says. I am not in a tournament. If the tournament has not started yet, I am not in a state of competition. I am a reasonable human being with realistic expectations.

After I am knocked out, I am, of course, "out-tournament". After I get my time to myself to process it all, my in-tournament self fades and I am back to being Hello Kitty. I am philosophical about my wins (if any) and losses (arrgh) and can discuss them in a logical manner. People say sh#t to me and I can generally deal with most of it/them -- if not, I have the presence of mind to just walk away. I am a reasonable human being with realistic expectations.

My in-tournament self is the last completely unreasonable feral thing about me and rather than let it run wild or have society shoot it dead, I've tried to manage it into a tolerable coexistence. I had a good showing at the Chet Itow Memorial tournament due to many factors but the biggest contribution was made by my intournament self.

When I am in a match my in-tournament self begins to run at top speed. While in this mode, all I can think about is winning and how to achieve it. The opponent I play no longer matters. Every mental resource I have is poured into finding a way to win. Great shots and great fumbles are all the same to me. If I make a great shot, I don't take pride in it -- it is one shot and there are many left. If I miss a ball with ball-inhand, I don't beat myself up over it -- all I can do is wait for another chance. I have 100% faith in all my decisions and I accept the consequences of those decisions. All I can think about is winning and all I do is push forward toward that goal.

It is between matches that I have the hardest time dealing with society. Although I am not in a match my mental state is still very much intournament. I am still 100% committed to winning. I do not care who I play next. The chart does not matter to me. I only want to bring the best game I have to the next match. I do not think about losing. I do not think about playing particularly well or particularly bad. I just want to continue moving forward.

I had a hard time dealing with the comments I received during the Chet Itow. My outtournament self will concede I had one of the easiest draws in the tournament and I sh#t out to win all my matches because that is the answer society wants me to say. I am never expected to cash well in a tournament of that caliber because you know that I'm no good. My in-tournament self would remind the populace that, easy draw or not, none of my opponents simply laid down and surrendered. They all played and even if I played terrible and sh#t out to win, I still had to slog through each of those matches to the end.

After my first loss, my in-tournament self was surprised, and not a little peeved, at the comments saying, "well, you had a good tournament" "certainly you didn't expect to win against him". To my in-tournament self, this tournament was not over. It was double elimination. As I said to one person, "I'm not out yet, so stop throwing dirt on the coffin." He reminded me there were "only pros" left in the field. And my answer was, I did not care.

My brash, absolutely driven in-tournament self grates on a lot of people. I get a lot of flak for being unreasonable, unrealistic, arrogant, ridiculous, stupid, unappreciative, unladylike -- you name it, I've been insulted/complimented. But, here's the thing -- when I'm in a tournament, why would I want to tell myself I am going to lose, that the only reason I made it thus far was due to luck? If that's the truth, I should just quit while I'm ahead and hit the bar.

By dint of paying an entry fee, we all have at least a little hope we will do -- something. Otherwise, why not stay on the sidelines and talk sh#t? Losing is easy. Whether you can win is unknown and therein lies the challenge. Winning demands you leave your comfort zone for the unpredictable. Winning demands you sometimes suspend reality, that you should first hope to do something beyond your everyday self and then throw everything you have behind that hope with no logical, reasonable chance of success. Hope is what turns the impossible into the merely improbable, and in doing so, gives you the chance for success.

Yeah, I had an easy draw. But, I had prepared for that stroke of luck for years. Then I had to demand more from myself in order to use the opportunity I was gifted, because, I assure you --I was entirely capable of screwing up every match I won. I didn't need people telling me I wasn't a good player or that I had no chance. I don't know why people feel a need to tell me those things, but I am telling you now, that sh#t is getting old. At least wait for me to be out of the tournament before you impart your unsolicited opinions. My out-tournament self will then be agreeable, logical, reasonable, and realistic. My in-tournament self will tell you to get lost because I am here to win and until that last ball drops and the cue ball doesn't scratch, no one -not you, not my friends, not a burning bush on a mountain -- will convince me I don't have a chance.

What Would a Sucker Do? (Part 8)

If you look around the room and don't see any suckers....YOU are the sucker!

You are playing 9-ball. What do you do?

Idea #1: "Hit the 1-ball into the clustered 3 and 4-ball and hope something goes!"

Idea #2: "Bank the 1-ball into the corner!"

Idea #3: "Hit the 1-ball paper thin on the right side to leave the 1-ball safe behind the 3 and 4-ball cluster"

Suckers...

Why aren't these the best ideas?

Idea #1: It is very unlikely that you will pocket a ball this way.


Idea #2: A bank shot here is low percentage and there is no future or payoff for doing that because the other balls are tied up.

Idea #3: Not a terrible idea, but there is a more powerful option.

Answer:

Notice that the 9-ball is near the corner pocket. You can play safe here AND set yourself up for a win by hiding the cue ball behind the 3 and 4-ball cluster and send the 1-ball near the 9-ball. Now it is likely that you will get ball-in-hand and be able to win the game by making an easy combo!







After the match was over I kept chatting with the same pool player until an acquaintance of mine from Laramie wandered over and challenged me to a game. I didn't want to be rude to my new friend, Jim Calderon, and just go play with this other guy, but he waved me ahead so I played a game. I won the match after playing much better then I had in my match earlier that night. Typical. I always shoot better in the hours after a tournament. It was then that Jim seemed to take an interest in my playing and he and I started shooting against each other.

Over the course of the next few days I learned more about my game from Jim then I have from any one other player. Because you see I never had a coach or anything like that. Nobody decided to teach me pool; I simply picked it up and worked it out. I'm always complimented on my stroke, which is long and even, and lately as I have been entering the pool world I've had a few people ask who taught me. But I can't really say, so I say I taught myself. That's why playing with Jim was a fresh new experience for me—he gave me good advice about my bridge hand, he questioned my shot choices, forced me to think about my leave, had me re-do shots that I missed until I got it, and just in general helped me out a lot with game. But not in an obnoxious way; instead we just played pool, sometimes I won, sometimes he won, and he corrected any problems that came up.

You might ask yourself why I, a young 22 year old girl, would drive to the middle of nowhere to watch pool, play pool, watch more pool, and then play pool until 3 a.m. and then 6 a.m. the next day. And honestly, all I can say is that you aren't a pool player if you have to ask that ques-

Despite only winning one match in my division, and honestly shooting pretty awful pool on my part, I am so glad that I went out to Saratoga. On Saturday I started playing pool at 10:30, took a brief break around noon to get a new tip on my cue, started up again at 1, and played until 4 when I then went and watched matches until midnight. After midnight I went straight back to the bar and proceeded to play with Jim until 6 in the morning. The only thing sending me to bed was the knowledge that I had to wake up at 10 a.m. to check out of my sketchy motel; otherwise I would have kept playing all night long. I watched Shane Van Boening and Rodney Morris battle once each day of my elongated weekend, I watched Raj Hundal, Stevie Moore and countless others play. I played for so many hours that I honestly couldn't even tally them up. And I got to meet tons of people who were passionate about pool as well.

Many of these people were people like Jim, players in the Master's division who seemed surprised at my passion for pool and my insatiable appetite for the sport. I learned their names (promptly forgetting most of them, unfortunately, I have a terrible memory for names), watched them shoot, and talked to them afterwards. I watched matches with them and talked about how when I watch a pro match I like to hypothetically run the table in my mind—picking a pattern of balls (1-3-5-4-2-6-7-8 for example) imagining what my cue control would be—and then I would compare that to what the player did. One player in particular would ask me at each table what I would do, or in the middle of a table how I would fix a problem ball or etc., and I was always proud when Shane or Rodney would do exactly what I said I would do. Hypothetically of course, I can see the shots, but I am working on the cue control to make them happen. But honestly, just being able to predicate the shots of a champion like Shane Van Boening really makes me feel good about my future in the sport.

I am excited to play in future tournaments, I am excited about the prospect of practicing and bettering my game, and I am excited about where I could be in the next few years. The power of youth is infectious and this is the first time I have noticed it: at 22 years old, I can do anything I want with my life, I have a long time to live it, and the open ended nature of it that I have bemoaned in the past finally feels liberating and exciting. I can honestly say that I hope to make something of my pool playing while also working on my music. Maybe someday I can gig at pool halls with a jazz combo and play in tournaments on the side.

That would be a good life.

I do not have the benefit of talent the top players have. As an average player who is slightly competitive, I do not have the luxury to play this game only for fun. I do not have the greatest of financial resources. My internal drive to win must outrun those shortcomings. I am not a good player, but given my drive and dedication, it is inevitable that I should be able to do something when given the chance.

I sometimes think the hardest pool player demographic to compete in is where I am (and lots of you are): good, but not good enough. That is, we're okay players but never expected to do well past a point. When we do well, it is often attributed to luck rather than skill and because of that, we never get a chance to enjoy our success. Social norms require we NOT say we played well to win, for fear of looking arrogant. Over time, we sometimes begin to believe it was all luck and no skill, and that reduces our faith in our own abilities. We then play down to how other people think we should play, not how we want to play. This is why I spend so much effort maintaining my out- and in-tournament personalities. One is to appease society (can't run from it forever) and the other is for myself. At times, I can flick back and forth between the two as easy as flipping a switch, but that ease is not sustainable the further I advance in a tournament.

Many years ago, I entered in a tournament. It was my first hundred-dollar tournament and something about the three-digit price terrified and thrilled me all the same. I had saved up money from my minimum-wage college job until I could afford the travel and entry. I went to the pool room literally jumping with excitement and I asked who else was going. There was no answer. One regular told me no one from that room went to that tournament because it would be throwing money away. I was shocked. I had always been told, by some of these regulars no less, that I needed to play better players to get better. Where better to do that than in one of the West Coast's biggest tournaments?

"You're not going to win that tournament. There are 256 players and you can't beat any of them."

I knew I was a sh#tty player then, the same way I know where I stand now. I am a reasonable human being with realistic expectations. "I know I'm not going to win the tournament, but I thought it was important to get tournament experience."

"You're throwing your money away. What's wrong with ten-dollar weekly tournaments?"

"It's not the same. I don't want to spend my life playing ten-dollar weekly tournaments."

"Well, then you go ahead and you throw your

money off that cliff into the ocean, if that's all the sense you got."

That image of throwing money off a cliff into the ocean has always stayed with me. I've thrown many thousands off that cliff in the name of tournaments and action -- and I'm still doing it

After we sat in silence a while, he said in a softer, conciliatory tone, "Hey, I think you can still get your money back. It's real early and if you write to them or call, maybe they'll give you a refund."

I looked at him with dead eyes. "A refund?"

"Yeah. You can still get your money back."

A refund. For real? A *REFUND*?! I laughed out loud at the idea. The feral side of me sprang into action and I've had problems managing it ever since. "There's only one acceptable way for me to get my money back. I'm gonna jump off that cliff and swim after it. And if I don't get it back, then at least I'm going to get my money's worth."

"You're frickin' crazy."

"You know it."
