Note from Editor: Due to an ongoing health issue, Tom will not be contributing new articles for awhile. For now, we will dip into his vast archives while he's on the mend. Please keep Tom in your thoughts and prayers.

Let's do some work this month to examine and distinguish a prominent element of performance, the relationship between success and trying. Conventional wisdom dictates that the more we try to do something the sooner we will experience success as in the adage, "If at first you don't succeed..." So, through the experience of working toward success in our endeavors we condition ourselves, in the face of difficulty or adversity, to put forth a mighty effort when called upon to excel. Let's perform an exercise to test the effectiveness of the accepted method for performing successfully.

Set up the balls for a rather simple cut shot as shown in the diagram. Pocket the object ball with a smooth follow stroke and center ball. Play the shot until the cue ball is returning to the near rail at X with

enough speed to hit the rail and rebound no more than twelve inches. Make the necessary adjustments to your speed and stroke until the cue ball is hitting the near rail according to the conditions described above. Once you find the target with the cue ball you should find it easy hit that target repeatedly.

After your cue ball is hitting X consistently play the shot a few times with your best punch shot to make the cue ball track as wide as possible with a center-ball hit and enough speed to hit the rail but rebound no more than twelve inches. Hit this punch shot until the cue ball is tracking at least as far as the diamond marked Y. If the cue ball is tracking beyond $Y$ with no english or draw, you have a powerful punch

stroke and a nice, wide position range with the center-ball hit. Play with the exercise for five more minutes trying to hit each diamond from X to Y including the side pocket. Pick out a diamond and play the shot adjusting only the amount of punch in your stroke to hit that diamond. Keep hitting the cue ball dead center and controlling the speed as described above. If you miss your target keep playing the shot making certain to try as hard as possible to get the cue ball on track. After five minutes, regardless of your success, put down your cue and take a short break to consider what you have been doing.

Evaluate your performance and ask yourself how hard you were trying. Chances are that putting forth a great effort did not help you to complete the exercise effectively. Let's go through the exercise again this time eliminating all effort to make the cue ball hit the target. Before shooting each shot pick out your target diamond and identify it clearly to yourself as the place where the cue ball will hit the rail. While still standing erect visualize the cue ball hitting that target with the desired speed as you feel your relaxed hand shooting the shot. Get down now to play the shot focusing on the object ball as you shoot and putting forth no effort to make the cue ball go to its target.

## Answer:

The differences between the professionals and the amateurs are that the pros establish a world ranking through either the Women's Professional Billiards Association (WPBA) or the World Pool Association (WPA). The WPA is the governing body for pool and asks organizations such as the WPBA \& BCA for their top ranked woman/men players to participate in tournaments such as the World Championships. I have been honored to represent the USA/WPBA and participate in 6 world championships.

How to become a professional? Over the years the formats have evolved, but currently the WPBA has created nine regional tours across the USA. The top players from each tour receive special invites to participate in the yearly Regional Tour Championships and the top finishers from that event get spots onto the WPBA for the following calendar year.

The WPBA awards points for participation on tour and at the end of the year if you have calculated enough points to be ranked into the top 32 then you become a touring professional plus get an invite to play the following year. At the end of the classic tour year if you're ranked below the top- 32 then you must re-qualify through the regional tours system.

Another venture is to compete in individual WPBA qualifiers. This is where all amateur players are welcome to participate in a tournament in which the winner receives a paid spot into a WPBA event. For more information I suggest visiting www.wpba.com or www.wpa-pool.com.

The men are basically the same, open to all independent events such as the Men's US Open, Turning Stone, and the Steve Mizerak Championships award points towards the BCA men's world rankings. Then the top men are invited to participate in events such as the World championships and additional international events. Also, the Mosconi Cup US team is comprised of the top finishers from the BCA points list. For more information on this visit www.bca-pool.com

## "Cueing Folks with Strokes" Fundraiser Raises Money for Denver Pool Instructor and Stroke Victim Tom Ross

Denver - The "Cueing Folks with Strokes" fundraiser was held Saturday, July $9^{\text {th }}, 2011$ at the Wynkoop Brewing Company at $163418^{\text {th }}$ Street, Denver, CO.

Money from the event helps pay daily living expenses for Tom Ross, a Denver pool instructor and former Billiards Digest Magazine writer who suffered a stroke last November.

Ross, 50, does not have health insurance and now requires expensive health treatment. At this time his ability to read, write and talk is extremely limited.


Steve Thomas - Tournament Winner
Steve Thomas of Denver won the pool tournament, his prize was a beautiful Murray brand "Californian" pool table donated by Tom Ross himself.

The event -- organized by Wynkoop Brewing pool pro Melissa "The Viper"Little-- raised approximately $\$ 4800.85 \%$ of the proceeds went to Ross, the remaining $15 \%$ was donated to Boulder Community Hospital's In-Patient Rehabilitation Center.

Staff from Boulder Community Hospital's rehab center were on hand at the event to educate attendees to the dangers of strokes.
"I want people to recognize the early warning signs of strokes," Little says. "Strokes have taken the lives of some of the heroes of our local pool community, and one has now turned Tom's life upside down. Quick action can save your life and limit the effects of a stroke."

Little has launched a Web site -www.cueingfolkswithstrokes.com that includes info on the early symptoms of strokes.

At the site pool players were able to purchase instructional DVDs produced by Ross and his pool partner "Dr. Dave." Money from the sales of these DVDs goes to Ross.

The event also featured a silent auction and "Challenge the Pro" matches with Little, Danny Medina and Mark Haddad.

Prior to the start of the event, players gathered to recognize those pool players who have suffered strokes, including Colorado's own Steve Knight. Knight lost his life to a stroke last year.

# Only Those Who Dare to Fail Greatly Can Ever Achieve Greatly

I've been out of town the past three weekends and I am now glad to have a breather. Two of those past three weekends saw me play in tournaments. One of those past three weekends saw me win. Every weekend featured countless (unsolicited) bits of advice and opinions (both well-meaning and assholic). I found it all very fascinating.

This past weekend, I played some fantastic pool and I played some crappy pool. You've probably figured it out by now, but fantastic + crappy $=$ craptastic. But, that's the way it goes, sometimes. In particular, I was made aware by more than a few people that I made some surprisingly bad decisions.

Where am I going with all this? Actually, I don't know. I'll just ramble on and let the Earl Grey + Bailey's do the driving. Oooh, hold on, the taco truck is here. I'll be right back..

All right, I've got ceviche, tacos, and my Earl Grey + Bailey's. It is only fitting, then, that today's post be about risk.

A significant portion of my pool game is based on risk. I'm primarily a shotmaker. (I play mostly

rotation-based games. Yeah. Settle down, smartasses.) A good deal of my style of play and approach to the game is a result of being $99.9 \%$ self-taught.

Since I had the good fortune to learn on my own, my game is entirely my own. By that, I mean my game is not influenced by anyone else's style or perception. When you go to an instructor, it is inevitable that they will teach you what works for them and their style will be instrumental in shaping your own. That's not a bad thing (unless you have a bad teacher - but "bad" is open to anyone's interpretation). Instruction is good because it gives you a boost (especially in the beginning) and you improve at a more rapid pace. However, instruction can also settle you into someone else's well-worn path. This is not a bad thing, either, and we'll return to that in a bit.

## So.

The best part about learning on my own was that there was no one there to tell me what was, or wasn't a good idea. Nothing was impossible until I decided it was impossible - and even then, I figured it was only impossible until I practiced enough or acquired the correct skill set to make it possible. (This explains why I didn't know what a defensive shot was for at least three years and didn't bother trying one for another two.) I tried to make everything. The result? I didn't make every-
thing - but I did make a lot of difficult shots most people would pass up. I also sold the farm many times due to trying the (almost) impossible.

Needless to say, I got a lot of "you know, you should have done this..." and "if you had done this, you would have..." and "if you'd let me teach you, I'll make you into a champion..." and my personal favorite, "oh my god, what in the world were you thinking?!" Heh. I understand most of these people (I'm not so naive to think all of them) had good intentions, but it made no difference.

When something hurts me enough, I'll change. Every major change in my game has been a result of finally losing enough money or losing enough times to the same douchebag or realizing my knuckles can't win forever against stucco walls. My game moves forward after the change and people wonder, "But I told you to do that before - why didn't you do it then?" It takes too long to explain that, mentally, my game was not ready to change. But, when I've hurt enough, I'll change it, and - best of all - I won't forget it.

How nice. someone just gave me a Coke. Let's add that to the hallucinogenic mixture in front of me I call "lunch" and fast forward to the present...

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# What Would the Pros Do? Vol. \(2 \substack{\begin{subarray}{c}{by Samm Diep <br> Ausut 20110} }

Volume 2 of "What Would the Pros Do?" takes us to the 2010 U.S. Open 9Ball Championships in Chesapeake, Virginia where the score is tied $5-5$ between Efren Reyes and Marc Vidal. After making a remarkable shot on the 7 ball in the side, Efren leaves himself dead, straight in on the 8 ball with the 9 at the other end of the table.
with the masse, the cue ball is sent loose and there is very little guarantee for position.

Drawing the cue ball straight back with low left-hand spin will get you close, but not close enough. You will have a hard time getting the cue ball anywhere near the center of the table. Once again, using such extreme spin and speed reduces the chances of pocketing the ball and in this case, with very little reward even if you do.

The best decision in this scenario is Option E. The only thing Efren has to do was decide what part of the rail to contact and adjust his speed accordingly. This shot is played with inside draw. The inside (right-hand) spin facilitates pocketing the ball and as an added bonus, it also causes the cue ball to bounce away from the 9 ball after it contacts the second rail.

This rail-first shot guarantees position on the 9 ball. In the event that you miss the 8 ball, it also carries the possibility
Commentators quickly identified his dilemma and suggested he might attempt a jump or masse shot. Efren scratched his head and contemplated all the possibilities. In the end, the choice was clear. Let's review his options:

Option A: Cheat the pocket.
Option B: Jump the cue ball.
Option C: Masse the cue ball.
Option D: Draw the cue ball.
Option E: Pocket the 8 ball rail-first.
Efren chose Option E.
The risk of attempting to cheat the pocket in Option A is too high. So many things could go wrong with this choice. It's far too easy to miss the shot when you place priority on playing position. Aside from missing the shot, there's also the extreme danger of jumping either or both balls off the table.

Jumping the cue ball in Option B requires a perfect hit and is also incredibly risky. The possibility of the cue ball and/or the object ball jumping off the table is quite high. This shot also requires an elevated cue and a very firm stroke. Once again, there is a huge chance of missing the shot.

The masse shot in Option C is not a bad choice but it's an extremely difficult shot that requires a lot of practice. This is not a practical shot and even with practice it's not guaranteed that it can be executed properly under pressure in competition. If you are able to pocket the ball
of a safety because the cue ball is sent down table while the 8 ball usually remains up table. Efren also knew that with the newer cloth on the TV table, the balls slide more and shots are more forgiving.

Like any new shot, do not attempt to execute this without practice. If you miss the shot, pay close attention to what side of the ball you're missing it. Don't be afraid to cut this ball. It's much better to overcut this shot than to undercut it. Remember that along with pocketing the ball, the other objective is to create distance between the cue ball and the 8 ball. Undercutting the 8 ball could easily result in selling out the shot.

Choosing the correct option won the game for Efren and allowed him to take the lead for the first time in the match. He went on to win 11-7. Both players demonstrated tremendous shotmaking and defensive play in this feature Accu-stats match. Efren shot a .871 and Marc

You will experience greater success in the exercise and your pool game as you spend more time playing in the context of not trying. How quickly you move into this realm will depend on how much effort you normally apply to making the cue ball roll into position. See if you can view the cue ball's movement on the desired path as something that will happen instead of something that you need to force. The greatest effort you need to apply to position play is in choosing and identifying the desired path for the cue ball; after making that choice you can allow your imagination to take over and let it happen.

When you feel comfortable with the center-ball shot you can move on to perform the exercise with draw, follow and english to work through the spectrum of available tracks for this shot. Go for each of your original targets with a follow stroke and the appropriate touch of outside (left) english to move the cue ball along the rail. Find the limits of the position range
from low, outside to high, inside english making note of how the cue ball moves after a certain hit, particularly those hits that move the cue ball to the limits of the range. Shoot for various targets in your range employing the visualization technique discussed above. You will find that the key element to hitting shots accurately is how clearly you identify your target rather than how much effort you apply to forcing the cue ball.

Take a minute to recall one of your great pool performances and a great performance from another of your endeavors or hobbies. As you relive these moments do you feel yourself exerting a large effort or do the greatness and virtuosity seem to flow from you on their own? Now recall a performance about which you or someone else might have said that you tried really hard or gave it a good try. Is this a memory of success? Think about memories associated with trying and see how many are efforts that fell short of a goal. Your breakthrough with this month's exercise will occur when you see that you have the power to generate greatness rather than having to wait passively for it to call on you.

# The 2011 BEF Junior Nationals 9-Ball Champions Are Crowned Danny Olson of Broomfield Takes Top Honors in the 18 \& Under Boys Division

Ms. Lee took on challengers and spent most of the evening signing Black Widow cue balls and posters that she generously donated to every player in the event. To top off the evening, an adult/child tournament run by volunteers Tammy and Mel Leonard far exceeded the team participation from last year, and jumped from 32 teams to 63 teams!

The player meeting was at 9 am on Thursday and Alicia Osborne of NIU did a beautiful job singing the National Anthem. Immediately following, tournament play began and those who did not have matches could enjoy more of the Black Widows demonstration and challenge matches throughout the afternoon.

In the 18 -and-under boys' division, the top finishers were no strangers to junior billiards. Danny Olson, of Broomfield, CO, determined to better his 4th place finish in 2010 and finishing a respectable 7th place in the 2010 WPA World Junior 9-Ball Championships, proved to be a tough contender this year. Olson steadily proceeded through the winner's bracket with

wins over Jeremy Johnson 9-2, J.C. Torres 9-1, Kevin Sun 9-7, Zachary Leonard 9-3, and Tyler Styer 9-3 before losing to Brendan Crocket 6-9. Crockett, 2009 champion of the 14 -and-under boys' division, smoothly sailed through the winner's bracket without a loss. Crockett defeated Refugio Vara 9-0, Edwin Gomez 9-4, Chris Byers 9-3, Chad Behnke 9-4 and Danny Olson 9-6 to claim the seat as the only undefeated contestant in the 39 player division. Olson faced Tyler Styer on the one-loss side in a match that almost sealed any chance of him winning his last opportunity, because of age eligibility, for a Junior National title. But a well executed safety by Olson when the score was $8-8$ found Styer's three-rail kick only inches short of hitting his target, giving Olson ball-in-hand on the 5-ball. Olson ran out for the win and a chance for a rematch with Crockett in the one set finals. Olson kept his winning momentum, capturing the match 11 games to 6 and his first title as the Junior National 9-Ball Champion.

In the 18 -and-under girls' division, Briana Miller zipped through the tournament losing only a handfull of games. The fierce and determined 15 year old bulldozed her way through matches over Kendra Britt 7-0, Caitlyn Shuping 7-0, Kendra Russell 7-2 and Brooke Zimmermann 7-3 before taking charge in the final match against Zimmermann, 9-0 and seizing her fifth title as Junior National Champion in the girls' division.

Billy Thorpe won his second consecutive title in the 14 -and-under boys' division by breezing through several matches including wins over Marcus Abney 7-2, Nathan Bourque 7-1, Sergio Rivas 7-3, Austen Russell 7-1, Joey Torrez 7-2 and Shawn Begay 7-0 before claiming the honors of being the only undefeated player in the 49 player field. Also moving forward through the winner's bracket was Shawn Begay of Gallup, New Mexico. Begay inched his way with victories over Nick Evans 7-6, Justin St. Andrews 7-5, JonMichael Monegato 7-4, Tyler Brandom 7-6 and Ricky Evans 7-3 before facing the reigning champion, Billy Thorpe, for the winner's bracket seat. Thorpe sent Begay to the one-loss side to battle with Austen Russell. Begay prevailed with a 7-6 win over Russell and earned a chance to dethrone Thorpe. Thorpe secured his title as reigning champion with a 9-5 win over Begay.

Experience has taught me what I, with my current abilities, can do and I use that information to give myself to best chances to win. However, as some of you may have seen, there are plenty of moments when I shoot a "why not" sort of shot. When I make those shots, people say I'm talented. When I miss those shots, they say I'm a moron. I'm cool with that because it's all part of my plan for improvement. As long as I keep improving (no matter how miniscule the rate), I'm fine with whatever speculations people make about my game.

Losing, as much as I hate it, is useful. I learn things from losses no instructor could ever teach me, and I remember it. I try risky shots because I don't fear them. I've come to terms with the possible consequences and when I shoot that shot, I won't regret it afterwards. Losing is the risk I take to test the boundaries of my abilities and there is no other way to do so. People tell me, "You should shoot that shot in practice, not in a match," to which I reply, "If you never shoot that shot under pressure in a match, why practice it at all?"

My game has improved in recent times. This is because of risk. I'm not afraid to lose and that is why I'm not afraid to shoot. There is no reward without risk. Sometimes, making a change drops
me from a high peak into a low valley, but if I believe it's for improvement in the long run, I'll stick with it.

In college, I once decided to track improvement in my game. I did the fifteen-ball drill (it's like a much easier variation of straight pool) fifty times a day (start with ball-in-hand anywhere and shoot from where the cue ball ends up at the end of each rack). The great thing about this drill was that it was ALL about shotmaking. You miss, you lose. Start over. I remember one instance where I ran 102 before missing. The very next attempt, I ran 2. Now that is a fall from a high peak to a low valley. When I graphed the results after six weeks (geek alert), the most prominent thing I saw was that 102 to 2 drop. Depressing. However, when I zoomed out on the graph, you could see that one steep drop was no more than a dimple in the larger scheme of things - and the larger scheme of things was a beautiful, gradual incline.

I am all about that incline. Of course, by the law of diminishing returns, it becomes exponentially harder to improve over time in a game like pool. Now, I have to expend more effort to improve only a little and there's an additional, very interesting, monkey wrench in the equation reputation.

It's all well and good when I swung away at fliers when I was a total beginner. Hell, I was expected to do stupid things because I didn't
know better. However, now I'm expected to know better so when I do take a flier, I get a lot of s-for it. There are moments when I feel that societal pressure to play what most people would say is "the right shot", to play the safety instead of firing away when I feel like it. Sometimes, it's not even societal pressure, but my own laziness.

When you have no desire to test yourself, that's when you plateau. Without expending any further effort, you're good enough to beat most people (or at least the ones you care to beat). In some cases, you surpass your instructor and since they have nothing further to teach you, if you don't actively push yourself, you'll level off at where your instructor has plateaued. But, hey, you're "good enough" for you and hell, it's a comfortable place to be.

If you are willing to risk falling, that is when you will figure out how high you can go.

I'll take the ups and downs route if only because it charts out like a heartbeat. Plateaus, while they may be comfortable, chart out like a flatline.
I have no idea if any of the above makes sense and, frankly, Earl Grey + Bailey's are telling me not to give a s- if it doesn't. So, cheers to being fearless. Swing away, Merrill!
